

At Douglas Primary Flying School Alf Day was my instructor. After graduation from Douglas I completed Basic at Warner-Robbins and Advanced, Twin Engine at Moody Air Base. After graduation I went to B-24 Transition at Courtland Air Base, Alabama. Crew training at Pueblo, Colorado.

In WW II flew the B-24 in the Pacific. In Korea I flew the AT-6 in a Mosquito Squadron (Forward Air Controller). During the flying portion of my military career I was current in the following aircraft: P-17, BT-13, AT-10, B-24, C-47, P-51, P-61, and AT-6.

I went off flying status in 1952. After leaving flying duties I served in the JAG as a base legal officer in Japan, the Office of Special Investigation as a Detachment Commander on a second tour to Japan, and as a Counter Intelligence Division Chief. Tours with AFROTC at Bowling Green State University, Ohio and Memphis State University, Tennessee, Director of Training for the Combined MAAG, Taiwan and Chief, AFROTC Operations, Hq. Air University.

I retired as a Lt.Col. on 1 Nov. 1972 after 30 years service. After retirement I taught History and Political Science as an Associate Professor for Troy State University in Montgomery, Alabama. I retired from full time teaching in 1958 and now teach part time, usually during the Fall and Winter Quarters, as an adjunct professor.
